Alliteration	The repetition of a consonant sound at the beginning of two or more words in a sentence, usually sequential
Hyperbole	Extreme exaggeration
Imagery	Descriptions with a heavy emphasis on one or more of the five senses: seeing, hearing, smelling, tasting, touching
Metaphor	A comparison of two unlike things without the use of "like" or "as"
Onomatopoeia	A word formed from the sound associated with it, (i.e. buzz, ding)
Personification	When a nonhuman object is given human characteristics
Simile	A comparison of two unlike things using the words "like" or "as"
Situational Irony	When a situation occurs that is the opposite of what one would have expected to happen
